The 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten Reading Logs are a paper option for your use to write down every book you read to your child. This may also be tracked via Beanstack at lowndes.beanstack.org

The reading logs can include any repeats and any books read by teachers and/or older siblings if applicable.

Once your reading progress is complete and your child has reached their next hundred books, they can add their name and progress to our 1000 Books Before Kindergarten Reading Tree at the downtown branch in the children's area.

How It Works

Register

Register your child by visiting the downtown branch of the Columbus-Lowndes Public Library and filling out a registration form at the upstairs information desk. You can also register online via Beanstack at lowndes.beanstack.org

Read

Grab a welcome packet with an enclosed paper reading log option and tips at any of the Columbus-Lowndes Public Library locations by simply asking a librarian!

Grow

With every 100 books read, report your reading progress and track your child's progress on our 1000 Books Before Kindergarten Reading Tree.

Go

After completing all levels and reaching 1,000 books your child will receive a prize from our 1BBK Treasure Chest, a free book, and an invitation to our 1000 Books Before Kindergarten annual Graduation-Registration Party!



Did you know?

1 book a night adds up to 365 books a year.

365 books in two years equals 730 books.

365 books in three years equals 1,095 books!

The Columbus-Lowndes Public Library has partnered with 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten to promote reading to newborns, infants, and toddlers. The program is held to encourage parent and child bonding through reading. As numerous studies estimate that as many as 1 in 5 children have difficulty reading.

Parents and caregivers are the first education providers during the 0-5 early critical years.
